It's Raining It's Pouring

The first autumn gales and rain caused havoc on the roads with closures and significant flooding. In sport, a number of soccer matches have already been postponed with waterlogged pitches and it won't be long until the winter racing card falls foul of the weather.

But, according to a British businessman, the solution is low cost, 100% effective, environmentally sound and requires no maintenance.

James Arrowsmith, managing director of Aquadyne Sales & Marketing, believes the answer to the sporting weather nightmare is a British invention. "Panels have been installed to dry out persistently flooding golf bunkers, to drain soccer and rugby pitches and even sort out flooded farm gateways," he says. "Weather forecasters are predicting that rain will increasingly fall in torrents and this is the worst of all for causing drainage problems."

Aquadyne is easy to install with a pedestrian trenching machine and a two-man team. The surface is hardly disturbed. With annual maintenance work now being carried out on golf courses, cricket pitches and many other forms of sports surfaces the drainage solution could not be easier.

"Cancelled games cost money and this simple solution will minimise this problem with little pitch disruption," adds James.
